The story behind our logo



The MBHS logo has been designed by Leonard Andy, Djiru artist.

The highlights of the composition are a Djiru shield (*Bigin* - taken either from the buttress roots of the Slippery Blue Fig or the Milky pine), a cassowary (*Gunduy* - being a significant animal, culturally and spiritually for Djiru) and saltwater country (the beach meeting the sea).

Traditionally, tribal ochres

Magera (yellow), Gunggu (red), Jillan (black), and Gaba (white) were used to paint the unique Djiru symbolised geometrical designs that appeared on shields.

South Mission Beach



South Mission Beach Road, was named by the then Cardwell Shire before it merged with the Johnstone Shire in 2007 to become Cassowary Coast Regional Council.

Kennedy Esplanade, named after Edmund Kennedy, Surveyor and Explorer, 1818-1848, who died on an expedition from Rockingham Bay, Cardwell, to Cape York.
